






▶ strategic considerations for organizations operating beyond national borders


as well as dealing with foreign investors within domestic markets

Cultural courses

Prof. Yuko Kawanishi (J. F. Oberlin University)

What is culture? What is Japanese culture? Is there anything uniquely Japanese? How can we study, analyze, and understand Japanese culture and the people? How have international as well as Japanese scholars viewed Japanese people, psychology, and culture? This course aims first to enable students to learn the basic perspectives and methodologies of Culture Studies in social science, and then to apply them to the understanding of contemporary Japanese cultural scenes. Students' active participation in class discussions and critical thinking is essential.

Japanese Society

(CULTURAL AND EDUCATIONAL DIVERSITY FROM MULTI-ETHNIC PERSPECTIVES)

Prof. Yoshiko Nozaki (Gakushuin University) Prof. Hiromitsu Inokuchi (Senshu University)

Utilizing "active learning" pedagogies, this course examines Japanese society, culture, and education from viewpoints of Japan's internal ethnic diversity in today's rapidly globalizing and internationalizing world. In particular, students will engage in various learning activities, including team research projects, with the purpose of understanding Japan's social and cultural diversity through the experiences of ethnic minorities. In doing so, we will attempt to overcome the stereotype(s) of Japan as a nation that clings to a belief in its own homogeneity and conformity and begin to view the issue of societal diversity from theoretical perspectives. Lectures by guest speakers and field trips will be organized in relation to the course content.


